Lessons from Lego

Playing with Lego is fun. At our home we have an area in our family room set up with Lego. We regularly build things, pull things apart and put things back together. Sometimes the structures collapse if they are not strong enough while other times we have to find something to separate the Lego pieces because they are too firmly stuck together.



When using Lego, you need to start with a strong foundation, something that will help you to build high structures. You need a strong and secure base. You can't start with something tiny if you are going to build something big on top. It just won't work. As you continue to build, you add more things, and change things to make it better.

Friendships are a little like that. A friend is someone you have laugh with, someone you can cry with, someone who will support you when things are not going according to plan. A friend is someone you can relax around and just be yourself.

What a friend we have in Jesus.




Guest Speaker - Henry Olonga Sunday, 7 April @ Christ Church (WAC) 9.00 am: ALL WELCOME!

Henry Khaaba Olonga (born 3 July 1976) is a former Zimbabwean cricketer, who played Test cricket and One Day Internationals for a career span of eight years. In domestic first-class cricket in Zimbabwe, Olonga played for Mashonaland and Manicaland. When he made his Test debut in January 1995, he was the first black cricketer - and the youngest person - to play for Zimbabwe. He was a regular member of the Zimbabwe team from 1998 to 2003.

He was considered one of the fastest bowlers in international cricket, but his international career came to an end in 2003 after Olonga and teammate Andy Flower wore black armbands during an international cricket match in the 2003 Cricket World Cup to "mourn the death of democracy" in Zimbabwe. Death threats forced him to live in exile in England. Olonga announced his retirement from international cricket after Zimbabwe's final game in the 2003 World Cup competition. Olonga and Flower were given honorary life membership of MCC later in 2003.^[1]



Students will only be able to attend the event if they have completed all the necessary documentation regarding their Duke of Edinburgh Award registration.


Gold Award Ceremony

TEACHING AND LEARNING 7-12

Naplan Online Lockdown Browser

Students in Years 7 and 9 will be completing Naplan online early in Term 2. In preparation for undertaking these assessments, students are required to install the lockdown browser onto their computers. This browser acts in the background when students have logged onto the Naplan site and prevents them from accessing the internet or using other programs that could assist in the completion of the Naplan assessments. Students can delete the lockdown browser once Naplan has been completed in Term 3. Most students have now downloaded the software. Students still having trouble will be given assistance this week.



Submission of Assessment Tasks

I reminded students on assembly this week of the importance of submitting assessment tasks. Students are encouraged to 'work diligently with sustained effort'. One aspect of demonstrating this is ensuring all tasks are submitted by the due date. Most assessments should be submitted to the teacher either before or during the scheduled class on the due date. Some tasks will require an upload to canvas while others will be submitted as a hard copy. Students should refer to the assessment notification for these instructions.

Years 9-10 Pastoral Care: Positivity and Resilience To conclude the Pastoral Care series for this Term, students considered key messages regarding RESILIENCE.



- To become stronger we have to work on our mental fitness, just as we do with our physical fitness.
- Stronger people cope better when challenging things happen in their lives.
- People can become even STRONGER after coping with a setback or difficulty in their life.

The following acronym was introduced and formed the basis for further group discussion through various activities:

Stay optimistic and look for the positives
Things will get better, but not always as quickly as you'd like
Reach out to others when things are worrying you or feel sad
Overcome unhelpful thinking with helpful thinking
Nobody's perfect. We all make mistakes
Get real and accept what you can't change
Everybody has times in their lives when things go wrong
Responsibility for a difficult situation can usually be shared



Student feedback was also collected regarding the Wellbeing Seminars Years 9 and 10 recently attended. The focus areas of the seminars were developing a strong sense of self, and building resilience and a positive mindset. The majority of students expressed positivity towards the sessions and learnt something from the messages conveyed. A few student responses:

- 'I learnt the importance of not instantly judging someone but waiting to get to know them and the reasoning behind their actions.'
- 'Your mindset determines how you will overcome hardships.'
- 'Even though you go through hard times there is always something good at the end of it, it might just take time to realise this.'
- 'You are more than who you appear online.'
- Be yourself and remember that everyone is the same level of boring sometimes.

Senior Chapel

The Senior Chapel Service for this term will be held on Monday, 1 April. The theme is 'Fix Your Focus'- What do you spend your time focusing on? Is this having a positive or negative impact? Is a change of focus needed? We are privileged to be hearing from Mr Warren Barker regarding this topic and what the Bible encourages us to consider. In Terms 2 and 3, 2019 Wollondilly Anglican College will be hosting an after College Football (Soccer) Development Program for students in Years 4 - 8. This program will be run by an external provider, Football Development Academy, to provide students with access to the best training programs with specialist coaches with years of experience. The program is open to all students in Years 4 - 8. Below is a brief outline of the program.

Who are the FDA:

Football Development Academy is a soccer academy based in the Macarthur South West Region of Sydney, Australia. Boasting a coaching team that have coached and played at the highest levels of the NSW NPL, we strive to develop aspiring footballers and guide them to reach their full potential both on and off the field - we know what it takes to get you there. About the Class Sessions:



Last Friday, Year 5 travelled into The Rocks in Sydney for an excursion which complemented our History unit on The Australian Colonies.

Our tour guides were called Ranger Pete, Ranger Jade and Ranger Toni. To start with we were shown what the people on the ships would have worn if they were either a convict, free settler or military personnel. Following this we were separated into three groups and given a tour of the town.

We were shown various sandstone buildings built during colonial Australia. There were also lots of stories of the different people who lived and died in this area, some at the hands of a very dangerous gang called the 'Pushers'. Gang members would lay waiting in dark alleys and literally push people down the stairs so they could steal from them. Most people died from their injuries.

We finished off the day at Observatory Hill. Here we completed several different activities. One was a game where you were given a question and had to run up and get the correct answer. The other was sketching what the town would have looked liked in early Australia time. We also had to write a letter home to our family and friends from a convict's perspective living through the initial establishment of the Colony.

'It was a great day and everyone enjoyed learning and exploring The Rocks'.




APPLICATIONS FOR ENROLMENT


Recent program evaluation has shown that 59% of people receiving ongoing phone support showed clinically significant improvement in their level of asthma control (Asthma Australia, 2016).


