- 4. **Pride in belonging**: A reflection of their gratitude for opportunities given and the encouragement of peers to be likewise rather than pretention.
- 5. **Building Community**: To be responsible members of our College, Broader Wollondilly, Australian and International community. To be "we" thinkers rather than "me" thinkers.
- 6. **A Second Education**: Our students' future lives; their virtues, morals, ethics, standards and character will be a product of their parents, College and peers. A quality Pastoral Care scaffold creates the environment for positive character traits to be developed and reinforced.

At a conference in 2004, Mr. John Lambert AM, former Director of the Board of Studies, NSW, mentor and friend, outlined the seven essential features that people were looking for in an Anglican school: Academic results, an educated person (student), Christian values, pastoral care and discipline, accessible fees, inspiring leadership and excellent teaching. It was helpful to us to check our vision against such a list.

Do you have a vision? Are you making the most of being at a College where there is opportunity and encouragement? If the answer is no - then make a choice to make a difference. There is an easy way through life that avoids disappointment but never amounts to anything. In the end, and all too late, it produces frustration and regret. Be warned



COLLEGE TRAFFIC ALERT

As we are a growing College, traffic will increase every year.

To assist us to make it easier for everyone please follow the instructions below.



- 2. To save last minute rushing and traffic, COME EARLIER! It is easier to find parking and more relaxed.
- 3. Don't park out on Remembrance Drive. It is a NO STOPPING zone and police patrol this road.
- 4. College roadway speed limit is 10kph which basically is crawling speed.
- 5. Be aware of your children in the carpark areas. Please don't let them run around the bus bay and car parking spaces.
- 6. Crossing carparks between vehicles is very risky as drivers travelling through them don't see you till you emerge from behind the vehicle, especially high vehicles.
- 7. Children being left in cars alone while the parent walks into the College to pick up siblings is a dangerous practice and must be avoided at all times.
- 8. Do not chat in carpark areas as kids get bored and run around cars while waiting for you.
- 9. There are two set down and pickup areas at the front of the College, one in front of White Cottage and the other around the flagpoles. We have now have two "A frame" signs outlining what to do and not do. The west end of the bus bay can be used for quick drop offs but please do not get in the way of the buses.

Please understand, our main purpose is to ensure safety on College grounds for everyone. The carparks and roadways are high risk areas which require strict rules. Let's all work together with patience in keeping it this way.

PASTORAL CARE T-12

Understanding eating disorders - Tips for Carers

The below tips are identified as the most important for a carer of a young person with an eating disorder. In the tips you can see a focus on education, self-care, use of language and a focus on help-seeking behaviours. Eating disorders are complex both psychologically and physically. Your own knowledge and understanding of such conditions are helpful when you are trying to support and navigate this with a young person as it will allow you to more fully understand the context for the young person. It is important to remember who the person is and not let the condition shape their identity.



A focus on feelings rather than food, when combined with open communication without judgement, will assist in reducing further negative patterns of thinking. Focusing on the positive attributes and qualities of the person (that are not appearance based) is important in reshaping self-perception. As a carer of a young person with an eating disorder ensuring that you are personally practising self-care is another essential way to show your support due to the ongoing nature of such conditions. Other psychological disorders including eating disorders do not work in a certain time frame, unlike some physical conditions. Lastly, early intervention and support is essential for eating disorders as professional help can begin a focus on the more complex aspects of such conditions.

- Learn as much as you can
- Remember who the person is
- Communicate openly
- Stay positive
- Make time for yourself
- Be patient
- Seek support



PASTORAL MATTERS - JUNIOR YEARS T-4

Children are born social

Social skill development is about the ability to recognise, interpret and respond to social situations in ways that society sees as appropriate. This kind of learning is passed on to children and young people by those who care for and teach them, through social relationships within the family or with friends, and through participation in the culture around them.



Through their relationships with others and their growing awareness of social values and expectations, children and young people build a sense of who they are and of the social roles available to them.

Young children are naturally self-focused

They often play beside, rather than with, other children and tend to think that everyone sees things the same way that they do. In early primary, children learn that others may see things differently from them. Teaching children how to put themselves in someone else's shoes helps them to relate better to others and manage conflict more effectively. It promotes caring, respect and fairness.

Some children and young people seem to get along with others easily

They bound in and out of groups effortlessly without a care in the world. For others, joining in or getting along with others doesn't seem to come so naturally. This may be because they've not yet learnt the social and emotional skills they need to get along with others.

How you can help:

- Set the tone for positive, supportive relationships
 - Establish trusting relationships with children and young people. Build a welcoming and warm learning environment by demonstrating respect, listening and having positive expectations about respectful and caring behaviour.
- Use everyday interactions as learning opportunities
 - Provide coaching and teaching to think through and solve the day-to-day social difficulties children and young people encounter. Where possible support problem-solving without taking over.
- Promote deeper thinking
 - Discuss moral issues with children and young people. Encourage them to state their opinions and reasons.
- Communicate effectively
 - Encourage children and young people to use effective verbal and non-verbal communication skills while interacting with you and others in the learning environment.
- Appreciate social and cultural diversity
 - Find out about the social and cultural backgrounds and values of children, young people and their families. Look for ways you may be able to accommodate their needs and perspectives.
- Deal promptly with discrimination and harassment
 - Teach children and young people about stereotyping and discrimination. Make it clear that these are unacceptable behaviours.

Year 12 Hospitality

This week Year 12 Hospitality assisted with the catering of soup before Family Chapel. This was a great way for parents, staff and students to share a meal together before family chapel but it also allowed the Year 12 Hospitality students the opportunity to practise their skills in catering and mass production.

The event also goes towards competency of their 'holistic' unit which brings together all modules studied. The students did a fantastic job in preparation, service and hosting the night and many thanks to all who supported this event. Money from the soup will go to the College's missions that we are supporting this year.







Year 9 istem

Mr Madden's Year 9 istem class have finished producing and coding their 'game boys' and have started a new and exciting project. This term they have been working on mechatronics unit and learning how to program robots and their associated sensors. At the end of the unit, they will undertake a 'robot war' to see whose robot will actually win a battle we are all looking forward to seeing this in action.



Year 9 Food Technology

Mrs Perri's class this term has been looking at 'Food Selection and Health' as their theory unit of study. They have in their recent assessment task investigated the nutritional needs of a specific lifestyle group and researched the amount of fat, protein, carbohydrates, vitamins and minerals that are needed for each stage of development. In practical classes they have also looked at factors that influence food selection and how economics, seasonal availability, culture and personal preference can play a role in food consumed and chosen. This week they practise their lattice pie making skills and produced some yummy desserts.



Year 10 Textiles Technology

Year 10 Textiles with Miss Bailey have been working on their 'Reduce, Recycle, Reuse' unit in which they have to repurpose an existing textile product or products to form another. Students are also looking at surface decoration techniques to embellish their items. Students have almost finished their work and they have made items such as an apron from repurposed jeans, notebook cover from repurposed clothes, wallet from jeans, and a door mat from strips of fabric. We can't wait to see the unveiling of their finished items.



Year 8 Mandatory Technology - Textiles

Students in Year 8 Mandatory Technology this term have been designing and producing a pencil case as part of their practical project. They have focused on fabric and surface decoration and have also learnt some basic sewing machine skills in the process.







COMMUNITY AND FAMILY STUDIES (CAFS): LEADERSHIP CASE STUDY

For a CAFS Assessment, my task was to develop a case study on a leader within the Wollondilly community by investigating their role, self-leadership, leadership styles and leadership adaptability. When I had heard about the opportunity to be able to contact a leader, I ambitiously chose the Mayor of Wollondilly, Matthew Deeth. To my great appreciation, he replied back agreeing to an interview. I not only collected great data which I could direct towards my case study but I was also able to be educated about his role as Mayor and what he is doing for our Shire.



The Mayor talked of his transformational and democratic leadership style as a representative of the people of the Wollondilly Shire. During the interview, I asked him about some current issues which I have become familiar with, being a local resident. These issues included road quality and street lights. The Mayor provided some thoughts on these issues (shown below):

Roads:

- There is a need to invest more strategically into local roads as previous efforts have not been as thorough, hence roads are failing quicker.
- Funding for local roads has been the victim of reclassification. There are roads that are now
 classified as regional which draws less State Government funding leading to more costs being
 passed onto ratepayers.

Street Lights:

Traffic has increased with housing developments and also increased the need for street lighting.
Street lights are costly and safety assessments need to be done to determine the design. For
example the intersection up on Razorback where people have requested for a simple light.
However, it requires several lights to light up the intersection properly which is where millions of
dollars are needed. Priorities are assessed as well looking at any safety issues that have
presented in the past.



INFORMATION FROM THE COLLEGE NURSE

National Burns Awareness Month an initiative by Kidsafe

As we head into winter there is a significant increase of risk of burns - this is not just for small children! As parents and caregivers it is a good reminder to be aware of prevention and treatment of burns. This could be due to for example by scalds from hot drinks, soups, contact from stove tops, curling tongs, fire place or flame injuries by misuse or accelerants.

First aid includes removal of clothing/jewellery of affected area (unless stuck to the skin).

Placing the burn under cold running water for 20 minutes. Cover the burn with a clean non stick dressing and seeking medical attention if the burn is on the face, hands, lap or feet, blistered or if the burn is bigger than a 20 cent piece.




