Begin with the End in Mind

In a year where there has already been significant changes occurring due to COVID-19, the word 'unprecedented' has been the catch cry of many commentators. With the retirement of Dr Quarmby, we are in a period of further change for the College.

While 2020 has been a year of significant (unprecedented changes), in retrospect, there has always been change. Over the 17 years that the College has operated there has been continual growth and development, economic downturns, challenges in meeting financial targets, floods, drought, bushfires, staff changes and government policy changes. Each challenge has been met and overcome, through God's guidance, with careful planning and adaptation to the circumstances.

Much has been written about 'Change Management' and the process of change for businesses and organisations. The consistent themes for successful management of change involve strong leadership, having clear motivating goals and objectives, clear communication, managing resistance to change and the modification of culture to encourage change.

Dr Quarmby's leadership has been critical to the success of the College over these years and we will miss him. Part of his legacy is the strength of his foundation, the vision created for the College, the core Christian values as the basis of that foundation as well as the quality of the staff and the College Council members.

The vision for the College remains - 'Wollondilly Anglican College endeavours to provide a disciplined, caring, learning community where students and staff pursue excellence and lives are transformed for Christ's glory'.

The five College 'Distinctives' are unchanged - 'A quality Christian Education', 'Towards Excellence', 'Pride in Belonging', 'Community Engagement and Involvement' and 'Education for Life (a Second Education)'. These foundations remain. They are embedded within the culture of the College and reinforced by the staff.

Change can create uncertainty, however in the case of Wollondilly Anglican College our past and the future have been founded on the certainty that God is still in charge and He walks with us.

To paraphrase the thoughts of Dr Quarmby in a staff devotion - God is in control of the destination.

Impossible obstacles become interesting challenges. Matthew 7:24-27 "Therefore whoever hears these sayings of Mine, and does them, I will liken him to a wise man who built his house on the rock: (25) and the rain descended, the floods came, and the winds blew and beat on that house; and it did not fall, for it was founded on the rock. (26) But everyone who hears these sayings of Mine, and does not do them, will be like a foolish man who built his house on the sand: (27) and the rain descended, the floods came, and the winds blew and beat on that house; and it fell. And great was its fall."

When we build on the rock, we hear Jesus' words and make them the foundation for our College, for our family and for our lives. It is not plain sailing. It is a narrow road and a narrow gate - full of pitfalls and hard climbs. We learn to allow Jesus to refine us and shape our contribution to His great work at the College.

Despite the changes we face, we will continue to build this College on the foundation that has been established over the last 17 years as we move into the future.

HSC Study Camp





Semester 2 - A Fresh Start

I trust the holidays were a time for relaxation as well as an opportunity to reflect on Semester 1, a most unusual start to the year. I have enjoyed hearing from students about some of the activities and travel they were able to do after a period of lockdown.

Students have been encouraged to look carefully at their Semester 1 Report, to be proud of the achievements and progress they have made, but to also look for opportunities to improve in the second half of the year. It is important to set SMART goals around learning and academic reports are a great tool to assist in goal setting. Students have been reminded of College expectations related to behaviour, uniform and classroom interactions.

Parent-Teacher Evenings provide a great opportunity to discuss progress with your child's teacher. These will be occurring in the coming weeks for students in Years 7-10 and I encourage you to partner with us through attending the Zoom Interviews. Dr Eaton will communicate more information regarding the process for these.

Homework Guidelines

At the start of a new Semester it is an opportune time to consider the importance of Homework in your child's learning. Homework is generally used to reinforce concepts taught in the classroom, although some teachers use a 'flipped learning' model in which students undertake some pre-learning at home before having the concepts taught explicitly in the classroom. Homework can also be a valuable tool for parents to engage with their child's education. As this Semester begins, it is good to be reminded of the following general guidelines for homework.

TEACHING AND LEARNING 7-12

Welcome to Semester 2

Welcome to Semester 2, I trust that the holidays were an opportunity to relax but also an opportunity to reflect on Semester 1. During the holidays, parents/caregivers would have received their child/children's report from Semester 1 and I want to encourage all students to look carefully at this document. They should be proud of achievements and progress they have made to date in subject areas, but more specifically, I want them to identify opportunities and areas for improvement in the second half of the year. Students should be encouraged to identify areas that perhaps they could work harder in or seek assistance to improve their overall performance. Setting goals around academic reports are helpful in seeking specific improvement and for students to be truly working at their given potential.

Professional Development Week

While students were enjoying the third week of holidays, the College staff were busy engaging in a week of Professional Development. Each morning began with a devotion from a staff member and it was encouraging to hear individual personal testimonies and how God is working in people's lives. Given the nature of our world at present, whole staff gatherings were held via Zoom and we were thankful for the blessings of modern technology.

Staff completed internal workshops on aspects such as 'Controversial Issues in Christian Education' and looked at how these issues align with the College's five distinctive Frameworks - specifically purpose driven. It was a thought provoking and reflective time in which staff acknowledged the impact they have on students in encouraging and broadening their knowledge and personal journey in faith.

Compliance Workshops were also held in mandatory areas such as Asthma Education, CPR, Emergency Care and Chemical Safety. The staff in secondary also spent a significant period of time reviewing programs, scope and sequences, assessment tasks and ensuring they align and meet NESA requirements. This was a helpful and a productive aspect of the week as the College will embark upon a review of teaching and learning in 2021.

Year 12 Study Camp

During the second week of the school holidays Year 12 had the opportunity to attend a HSC study camp that provided students with the opportunity to have a sustained, structured and focused study time supported by a variety of staff at the College. Staff volunteered their time to assist students, which included revision seminars on various topics, unpacking and approaching certain styles of questions that they may face in their upcoming trial examinations, opening the TAS workshop so students could work on major projects as well as providing an opportunity to sit practice examinations in a timed environment.

From a pastoral care perspective, we hope this time was helpful for students who may feel anxious about their upcoming examinations, and that from participating they may feel more confident in their approach to what can be a stressful time.

Service Learning Programs Semester 2

This semester, during the Pastoral Care period, students will be focusing on service learning projects. The aim of this program is to:

- Inspire servant leadership.
- Develop effective community partnerships.
- Provide opportunities for authentic student participation where the students become actively involved in their own learning and wellbeing.



Groups will be provided with opportunities to support the College community, local community and international partners. Students will work on a range of projects. These experiential projects will provide opportunities for students to learn in real world contexts and develop connections with their communities.

This year's projects will focus on students' interpersonal development. Particularly, students' ability to work well with others, and build leadership and communication skills.

Term 3 Chapel

The Middle Years Chapel program will be investigating Jesus' life and ministry. We will be looking at the things Jesus taught us during his time on Earth and how we can still apply His teaching today. We will be using the eye-witness accounts of the first four books of the New Testament (Matthew, Mark, Luke and John) to learn about Jesus' authority and wisdom, as well as the reactions of the people around Him.



STUDY CAMP

The Year 12 Study Camp, held during the second week of the July holidays, was very successful. Our aim was to support the students in their development of organised study habits and to assist them in their preparation for their Trial HSC Exams which start in Week 4 this term. Over 40 students attended each day, and many of these students found that studying in different surroundings enabled them to avoid the distractions they might have battled with at home.

Over the three days our Year 12 students had the opportunity to have sustained, structured and focused study time supported by staff volunteers from the College. These members of staff provided helpful advice, one-on-one assistance and guidance on essay writing and past examination questions. A number of students used this time to make valuable progress on their Major works for Art, Design and Technology and Extension English.

Subject specific workshops for English, Modern History, Chemistry, CAFS, PDH/ PE and Hospitality were also held this year, with particular focus on responding to exam style questions and engaging with marking guidelines. Many students commented that the practical nature of these workshops helped them to refine their skills and build confidence in how to manage the expectations of the exams.



Approximately 80 students are participating in the WASP academy. These smartly dressed and athletically eager students take part in Wednesday afternoon skills sessions in either Netball, Football (Soccer) and Cross Country.

WASP Cross Country

In the first session of the Cross Country program, students were challenged to achieve their most competitive time in either a 5km, 3km or 2km run. This time will be used as their benchmark to see how their fitness is improving as the program progresses.

Last Wednesday's session showcased the impressive cardio-vascular horsepower of many of the participants. The running rivalry of the Cook siblings, Lachlan and Abbey, was as fierce as ever. Abbey was hot on heels of her older brother, posting 10.55min for the 2km circuit. While Lachlan achieved a fleet-footed 15.20 on the 3km circuit

Isabella Evans ran like a modern-day Pheidippides (the ancient Greek messenger who ran to Athens to proclaim victory over the Persians), posting a tough-to-top time of 13.56 in the 3km circuit. Though not from primary, Dean Haddock set the standard for the 5km track, achieving a hard fought 29.35min. Dean's final sprint demonstrated his determination to finish strong.

Just As I Am!#

September 22, 1871 witnessed an elderly British lady, 82 years young, ushered into her heavenly reward. Earlier in her life, in 1835, her frustration at being an invalid left her feeling useless and questioning her very salvation. What she did next would echo through history.

As a young woman, Charlotte Elliot was not sure of her relationship with Christ, not sure of how to be saved, even though she had been raised a minister's daughter, and the probing question of a Swiss evangelist, "Are you at peace with God?", would not leave her mind.

When she saw the evangelist a few weeks later, she mentioned that she could not shake his question. But, she protested, what could she possibly bring to God? When he replied that she need not bring anything but herself, she gladly accepted Christ. Some twelve years later, in 1835, crippled by illness and constant fatigue, she felt saddened by her inability to help a local church's cause.

Remembering her conversion, she took out pen and paper and wrote a poem to encourage others who felt perhaps they too had nothing to give...

"Just As I Am, without one plea, But that Thy blood was shed for me, And that Thou bidst me come to Thee, Oh, Lamb of God, I come..."

Her poem was published and she was inundated with requests for it. She was gladdened to discover later that some copies were being sold to raise money for the very cause she felt helpless to assist!

After her death, thousands of letters were found in her home, written by people whose lives had been transformed by her words.

Her song has been translated into hundreds of languages, published in more than 1600 hymnals, and has reached billions around the world, and continues to bring people to Christ even today.

Sixty years later in 1931, too on September 22nd, a 31-year-old man riding in the sidecar of his brother's motorcycle in England finally reached the end of his internal struggle against whether Christ was indeed the Son of God.

He finally knew in his soul that indeed Jesus was just who He said He was! He realized that God calls us to Him "just as we are".

When C.S. Lewis stepped out of the sidecar, he was a new man, saved by grace! Ninety-nine years after Charlotte Elliott penned her words, and 3 years after Lewis' conversion, the 16-year-old son of a dairy farmer listened intently as he heard the message of salvation preached at a revival service in Charlotte, NC. When the song, "Just As I Am," was sung at the end, young Billy Graham went forward to accept Christ.

Twenty years later, Billy Graham had become a successful evangelist and was invited to speak at Cambridge University in England. His nervousness over the event nearly led him to cancel it. But he was introduced to a kind man named C.S. Lewis who encouraged him to disregard the critics who had spoken out against him, and to continue with the revival.

Rev. Graham went on to speak to an overflow crowd of 2,000 each night of the revival, and when he returned to England in 1989, he addressed a crowd of 80,000 at England's Wembley Stadium! As always, he closed the event with the same song that brought him to Christ, "Just As I Am."

Never think you have "nothing" to bring to Jesus! That is exactly what He wants you to bring... nothing! He wants you, just you, as you are! He can take frustration like Charlotte Elliot's, skepticism like Lewis', and nervousness like Billy Graham's, and reach the world through you!#

Just as I am, though tossed about with many a conflict, many a doubt, fightings and fears within, without, O Lamb of God, I come, I come.

....as the Lord has assigned to each his task. I planted the seed, Apollos watered it, but God has been making it grow. So neither the one who plants nor the one who waters is anything, but only God, who makes things grow. The one who plants and the one who waters have one purpose, and they will each be rewarded according to their own labor. For we are co-workers in God's service; you are God's field, God's building. (1 Corinthians 3:5-9)


