Begin with the End in Mind

Whether an educator has been teaching for one year or twenty, the process of learning effective teaching practices that make a difference in the classroom is an ongoing one. A finalist nominated for Teacher of the Year Australian Education Awards 2020 (theeducatoronline.com) listed the following effective teaching practices.



- 1. Always remember why you chose teaching as a profession be passionate, love what you do, value your role as an educator, always remember as teachers we are privileged.
- 2. Always have high realistic expectations and be specific about learning intentions to your students make sure it is clear to your student what they are learning about and what the goal is for the lesson.
- 3. Value each student and their uniqueness be positive and find ways to modify and make each learning opportunity meaningful. Enjoy celebrating the little and big successes, share the joy you have in seeing them learn!
- 4. Be organised, use a variety of learning stimulis (auditory, visual and tactile) have learning routines, it can allow the students to feel confident in knowing what is coming next.
- 5. Connect the curriculum to your students' interests and life experiences create fun learning opportunities with real life experiences.

Learning the skills that contribute to quality teaching is a long and complex process. Each class and each student is different and the learning process is influenced by a range of variables.

Teachers are required to meet and maintain certain Professional Standards as part of their accreditation to work in the teaching profession. The Seven Standards describe what teachers should know and be able to do.

Specifically, the knowledge, practice and professional engagement needed for high quality effective teaching that improves student learning outcomes. Teachers' demonstration of the Standards will occur within their specific teaching context at their stage of expertise and reflect the learning requirements of the students they teach. The Seven Standards are:

- 1. Know students and how they learn
- 2. Know the content and how to teach it
- 3. Plan for and implement effective teaching and learning
- 4. Create and maintain supportive and safe learning environments

- 5. Assess, provide feedback and report on student learning
- 6. Engage in professional learning

7. Engage professionally with colleagues, parents/carers and the community

While the Seven Standards and the five effective practices listed above capture much of what we consider to be part of quality teaching; at WAC we incorporate an additional dimension. In line with the College vision of endeavouring to '... provide a disciplined, caring, learning community where students and staff pursue excellence and lives are transformed for Christ's glory', the aim of staff is to provide quality education within a Christian framework. So a distinctive characteristic of educating students at WAC is the Christian framework that is embedded throughout the culture of the College. It is part of our DNA.

This means that we want our students to be 'Purpose Driven' and understand that they have value and worth because God created them, loves them and has made them for a purpose - not for what they have or haven't done.

Our goal is that our students will be transformed by the Gospel and they will develop as young people who are principled, connected to their families as well as their local and global communities, service minded and outward focused.

A challenging goal but one we believe is essential and achievable in providing quality education to the students at the College.

New Building Naming

The decision has been made to name our new Stage 12 building - Quarmby Cottage.

Historically the criteria used to name our buildings has been based on Christian pioneers. Year 12 Formal Term 4

I spoke with Year 12 on Tuesday regarding the possibility of the Formal happening in Term 4. The Premier has indicated that some restrictions will be lifted to allow this important rite of passage to occur.

We are expecting further details about how this will look from NSW Health on the Friday, 11 September. The Formal will need to occur after the completion of the HSC examinations and prior to the end of the College year. We are in the process of determining a suitable date and venue.

Once we are able to confirm details Mr Croger will write to the parents of Year 12 explaining the details.

Year 11 2021 Subject Lines

After careful consideration and significant modelling, we have now finalised the subject lines for Year 11 2021. We have almost a 90% success rate of students receiving their preferred or reserve subjects.

I have been interviewing those students who have missed out on a subject. These students have received a report that will allow them to make a decision based on the subjects available on the line.

I have asked that the students who I have interviewed return their forms indicating their subject preference, signed by a parent by tomorrow, Friday, 11 September.

Time management

Time management is a crucial skill for all students to develop regardless of what year group they are in. Effective time management skills will lead to less stress when tasks are due, more productive learning and most importantly getting assignments completed to a high standard. Time, however, is a 'resource' and needs to be managed.

There are a few thigs I reflected upon when I thought about time and these include:

- Every single person has the exact same amount of time in a day. In fact there are 86,400 seconds in a day and 1440 minutes
- Time cannot be 'banked up', we cannot simply go to the shops and buy ourselves more when we run out
- We can't give it away, we cannot borrow it from someone else nor can we get it back once it's gone
- Time is not discriminatory your age, gender, culture or religion does not influence 'how much' of it you get given we all literally have the same.
- A brand new mother will comment that time has flown by first her baby walks, talks, crawls and next thing you know the child has started school.
- A student sitting an exam will often say it was the longest three hours of their life!

Effective time management allows students to complete more in less time, because their attention is focused and they are wasting time on distractions such as social media. Efficient use of time reduces stress, and provides a sense of achievement and purpose. When students utilise time effectively it allows them to submit tasks on time, stay engaged with their learning, and have more time to devote to personal interest.

Top tips for effective time management for students... and perhaps all of us include:

- 1. Set goals or make a 'to do' list. It's almost impossible to use time well if you don't know what to do with it. Students can benefit from having short term and long-term goals. A short-term goal might be write the introduction to your English essay and the long-term goal might be having the whole essay finished by the end of the week.
- 2. Prioritise items that are coming up first as these will help to reduce stress and trigger points.
- 3. Organisation: Effective use of the College diary or an electronic calendar to visually see what tasks are coming up and what tasks are due. The same with your study area, is it a neat and tidy environment that will allow you to start what you need to do.
- 4. Reduce distractions: Put away unnecessary devices such as mobile phones, as they can be big 'time wasters'. Playing music is ok as you study, but if you are continually looking to change songs and make play lists this too is becoming more of a hindrance then a help.
- 5. Set time limits: Allocate specific time to tasks and then stick to those times. When time runs out, move onto the next task.
- 6. Block out chunks of time that you know you must commit to, such as, extra curricular activities, chores and any part time work commitments. That way you can see how much you can actually allocate to your tasks and assignments.
- 7. Avoid multitasking. Divided attention is an inefficient way to learn. Focus on one task at a time for maximum productivity.
- Start your least favourite tasks first. Often we leave the things we don't like doing to the last, but starting them first will get them done quicker and will avoid the procrastination that can often be attached to these tasks.
- 9. Avoid perfectionism and fussing over unimportant details. Trying to make your work perfect especially the first time round is frustrating. Get something down and done and then come back and improve later.
- 10. Finally, reward achievement When a big task or an assignment is completed and it has taken a lot of time and effort, reward yourself for your commitment. Do something fun like go for a bike ride or catch up with a friend.

Year 11 Exams

All the Year 11 students are aware that their end-of-course exams occur in week 8 - Next week. They start Monday, 14 September and end Friday, 18 September. Students have been issued with an examination timetable, but if they have misplaced theirs a copy can be collected from Mrs Talbot. Students are reminded it is a normal College day, and in between exams they will be attending normal lessons. Students were also reminded about the formal nature of this event and procedures to follow if they feel unwell or sick.

PASTORAL MATTERS - EDUCATIONAL PSYCHOLOGIST

The Importance of Positive Feedback

I recently spoke to the Year 11 students about the importance of seeking and asking for feedback, especially when they feel like they have under-performed. It is also important to look at how we give feedback and the type of feedback we give.

Psychologist John Gottman believes that he can predict whether a marriage will end in divorce with 90% accuracy based purely on observing a couple for 15 minutes.



How is he able to do this? He simply observes how many positive and negative

interactions occur in this 15-minute window. Gottman theorises there is a "magic ratio" for positive to negative interactions of 5:1. Basically, for every one negative comment you hear, it needs to be balanced out with five positive comments. Anecdotally, you can probably see this effect in your own life. Most people focus on negative feedback far longer than positive feedback, and are more affected by negative feedback.

This "magic ratio" has been found in a number of other areas, not just marriage. Balancing positive and negative comments leads to better outcomes at work, improved behaviour for children, and stronger relationships between adults and children. The ratio changes, but most people agree that the ratio falls somewhere between 4:1 and 8:1.

It's important to note that this ratio indicates that not all negative feedback is bad. In fact, negative feedback is actually necessary. Nobody is perfect and everyone makes mistakes, so using negative feedback in these situations will help to keep children on track, re-teach any behaviours or ideas, or give people an opportunity to reflect on their mistakes. But it is important to always keep our negative comments surrounded by a higher percentage of positive comments.

When giving positive feedback, there are a number of things you can do to ensure that kids are as receptive as possible:


- Positive feedback should be as immediate as possible. When you are able to praise someone straight after an event, they are more likely to associate that event with the positive feeling they get from being praised.
- Positive feedback should be specific. The more specific encouragement is, the more sincere it will sound. Specific comments also signal you have paid attention and really taken an interest in them. Instead of being general ("Good job!") try to find something specific to praise them about ("I really like how thoughtful that answer was.")
- Praise kids process and effort, not their achievement. Praising a kid's ability and result may have short-term effects, but may hinder a kid's long-term ability to be resilient when facing difficult situations. When someone gets a good exam mark, instead of praising the result ("You're so smart, that grade is great!"), focus on the process and effort they put in ("I can see that you worked really hard, great job!").
- Avoid comparing kids to others, especially their siblings. This one is an easy habit to fall into, especially for parents. But anyone with siblings knows how demoralising and frustrating it can feel to be compared to a sibling, and be expected to live up to their expectations. It can also set up kids for future disappointments.

I am delighted to advise that the Wollondilly Anglican College Scholarship Program will be opening soon for academic and creative arts scholarships commencing in 2022.

The College Headmaster may award a number of scholarships offering partial fee remission for each year in the areas of Academic, Music and Dance. Application Process for Scholarships

Academic Scholarships

(Parents will need to create a Parent Account, from which they can register their child for the scholarship test at Wollondilly Anglican College. A \$100.00 application fee is also payable to ACER as part of the registration process).
- For Academic candidates, be available to complete the scholarship test on Saturday, 27 February 2021.

Music and Dance Scholarships

- Parents should complete the scholarship application form and return it to the Enrolments Officer, Mrs Kristy Biddle, with the supporting portfolio.
- Music/Dance scholarships need to be accompanied by a scholarship application processing fee of \$100.00.
- Short listed students will be required to audition before a panel at a later date to be confirmed. There will not be an additional audition fee.

Applications will open on Tuesday, 29 September 2020 and will close on Friday, 5 February 2021. The closing date is final and late applications cannot be accepted.




