

Duke of Edinburgh's Award - National Gold Award Ceremony

Last Friday two of our current students and two former students were presented their Gold Award at an event that marked the 60th Anniversary of the Duke of Edinburgh's Award operating in Australia.

Congratulations to Jade Grindrod (Year 12, 2017), Noah Sarkis (Year 12, 2018), Annaleise Forbes and Lilli Madden (both in our current Year 12), who received their Gold Award at the ceremony.

The event was held at Sydney Town Hall where 400 young people from all over Australia were presented with their Awards in the presence of his Royal Highness, Prince Edward (the Earl of Wessex), the Premier of NSW and the Lord Mayor of Sydney. It was the largest Award event to be held outside of the United Kingdom.

The Award recipients were placed in groups and met successful Australian citizens who acted as ambassadors for each group and introduced them to Prince Edward as he moved between each group during the event.

Below is some information about this organisation that we are supporting -



Mission Aviation Fellowship (MAF) is a Christian organisation that provides aviation services for people living in remote areas around the world.

For over 70 years, MAF has been serving isolated people by using aircraft to bring in the essentials of life as well as medical care, emergency food, and Christian hope.

Our purpose is to deliver practical and spiritual care to people in places of deepest human need. Every four and a half minutes, a MAF plane takes off or lands somewhere in the world. These flights enable crucial work by many aid and development agencies, missions, local churches and other national groups.

MAF is serving the Church and communities in remote areas where flying is not a luxury, but a lifeline. <u>maf.org.au</u>

The College has had a long standing partnership with MAF dating back to our involvement with MAF as part of our Arnhem Land Mission Trip. Students are asked to bring a gold coin to donate to the organisation that will be collected during Roll Call on Wednesday, 25, Thursday, 26 and Friday, 27 September. The House Group that raises the most money will be announced later that day at the Talent Quest.

Students in Years T-11 will be able to wear House Shirt and Sports PE Uniform. Students can choose to wear Sports PE Tracksuit Top and bottoms or College Sports Shorts. 
World's Greatest Shave

TEACHING AND LEARNING 7-12

Naplan Results Arrive

Naplan results were released to the College last week and we have been undertaking an analysis of these. A preliminary evaluation shows that a large number of students have had pleasing gains and in most areas the College continues to perform at levels equivalent to or above statistically similar schools and State averages.



Naplan results are used in two main ways at the College:

- Teachers use results to help them identify students who require greater challenges or additional support.
- To identify strengths and weaknesses in teaching programs and to set goals in literacy and numeracy.

Parents are reminded that the Naplan results, while useful are only a snapshot at a particular time. There are a range of variables that can impact these results, such as your child feeling unwell on the day the tests were sat. The College reports provide greater detail your child's progress throughout the year, taking into consideration multiple assessments.

HSC Minimum Standards Tests

This week some Year 10 students will be sitting their online HSC Minimum Standards Tests. Students master basic skills at different stages so there are multiple opportunities available for students to pass the minimum standard online tests, from Year 10 until a few years after Year 12.

Wollondilly will provide those students required to sit the online tests with two opportunities in Years 10, 11 and 12 to meet the minimum standards. The development of Literacy and Numeracy is embedded in all curriculum areas, and we have been working with students throughout Term 3 to develop specific skills related to the nature of the online tests. Students requiring to sit the online tests will undertake these during Week's 8 and 9 of Term 3 during College hours.

YEAR 12 CHEMISTRY EXCURSION TO SYDNEY UNIVERSITY

Year 12 Chemistry students attended the Kickstart Program at the University of Sydney this Term. They participated in practical activities such as determining the sulfate content of fertiliser and analysing water quality using different titration techniques. It was both informative and enjoyable and the students are to be commended for their behaviour and willingness to participate.



INAUGURAL HSC Science Extension Presentation Night

This year marks the first class to do the exciting new course HSC Science Extension. Students choose a research topic and write a report on their investigation. Last week they gave short presentations on their work. Such was the quality that each project has been entered into the NSW Young Scientist Competition.

Their projects spanned the study of ant behaviour, using Daphnia to detect pharmaceuticals in our waterways, investigating the efficiency of rotating solar panels, genetic links to fingerprints, the effect of pH on the efficiency of luminol at crime scenes, the properties of honey and noise reduction in aircraft engines.

MUSIC AND THE BRAIN - WEEK 3

'Oh dear...I forgot my instrument today. But I have my music!' A phrase I hear in the classroom when students don't want to play their instrument or can't play their instrument because the instrument isn't physically at the College. The good news is; students don't need a physical instrument to practice because we all walk around every day with an instrument we use every day. Our voice.

Students can use a starting point, provided to them by another student or teacher and begin to practice their music by singing what they see. Sometimes it can be difficult for the Flute or Piccolo player to sing their very high, fast melodies or the Trombone/Tuba player to sing their very

low, sustained melodies. But the point is, reading and recognising pitch and contour helps develop their sense of what the music will sound like. Students can also use this strategy when reading music for the first time and they don't have their instrument in front of them. Sight singing is a skill that is assessed in the Music 2 course for the HSC, singing a melody not previously seen before an examiner with the starting note played for the student.

However, another strategy is physically practising without the instrument, imitating the physical movements of playing their instrument. 'Score reading away from one's instrument enables the brain to form an impression of sound from the notation. This engages the musical imagination.' (Griffin, 2017) Students who turn up to a rehearsal and say they'll have to go home because they don't have their instrument will no longer have an excuse.

By utilising these strategies, students can prepare better for their actual performance as they visualise each note, its tone, speed and other specific musical details. Something we should always try to do before physically playing our music.

Singing is not bad. We should be able to sing what we play (as instrumentalists). But we can always pat our legs as drummers, play piano on the desk or move our arms forward and backwards to imitate the slide of the Trombone. For any instrument, a method is possible. For the last Waratah of this term, we will look at the student who turns up with nothing.

Year 12 Design and Technology

Congratulations to Mr Madden and the class of 2019, who had their Design and Technology projects marked at the college by the NESA markers on Friday, 13 September. Students have had to write their own design brief and come up with their own design problem and work towards a possible solution to their given idea. They started this process in Term 4 of 2018, and have worked on their projects all year. Projects are currently on display in the Flynn IRC and I would encourage you to all have a look at what they have created.

My project aims to encourage families with young children to compost whilst informing them about the impact of food waste in an accessible manner. As such, a 100% biodegradable food scrap holder can be replicated through the utilisation of craft-like construction techniques such as making 'putty' and 'slime' out of common waste products such as shredded paper, cardboard and egg cartons, alongside 'bio-plastic' using starch and other household ingredients. It is designed to hold fruit and vegetable scraps before being buried in the backyard, prompting families to learn about the benefits of composting, form a fundamental habit and subsequently seek more permanent solutions

My project is a collection of children's clothing for girls that are made from sustainable and recycled materials such as tablecloths and second hand clothing/fabrics that could replace a child's wardrobe and be worn throughout each season. This collection focuses on a minimalistic approach to life due to the reversible nature of the garments as well as the neutral colour pallet that makes each item easily wearable with each other.

I created an 'Electronic Kiosk Kit' which is a DIY electronics and Internet-Of-Things project aimed at encouraging young people to explore the electronics and programming world. The project is Raspberry Pi based includes features such as an app controlled light, wireless phone charging, the weather, calendar synchronisation and Spotify integration.

The system can be controlled using an app that I built for Andriod to change the music and adjust the brightness among other things. It was 3D printed and assembled, and all the programming is open source so it can be accessed and modified to suit the needs of the user.


Term 4 Gala Days
